"Total Defense" is to be the keyword of the League of Women Voters' program during the coming months—total defense against civil liberties and political, economic, physical and military preparedness.

Mrs. John K. Ormond, of the Birmingham branch of the League, presented the program during the meeting of the State Board at Lansing on February 11 and brought back with her the following credo of the Michigan League:

"1. Civil Liberties—front line of defense.—We reaffirm our belief in the rights of the citizen of this country and of the American people. We insist that the rights of all our people be protected, including the rights of the individual, the economic and the political.

"2. Economic Defense—Dietary standards should be set for the people to be fully protected in their homes, and the right of unemployed workers or potential workers to be assured of their right to their homes.

"3. Physical Defense—Dietary standards should be set for the people to be fully protected in their homes, and the right of unemployed workers or potential workers to be assured of their right to their homes.
