The advanced foods class of Baldwin High School plans to sell one-half and one-ounce jars of orange marmalade to raise money to buy an electric mixer for class use.

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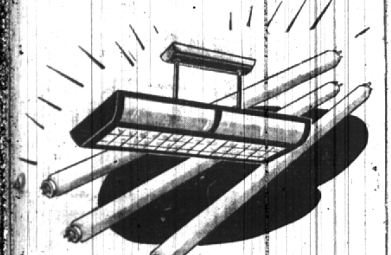
