Shoplifters made off with \$45 in merchandise at the Kay Bann Shop Saturday afternoon. It was reported to police.

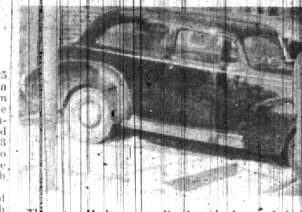
