F. A. Protheroe Is Conductor Of This Group

Welcome news, no doubt to frequent and secure of Birmingham and Hills music enthusiasts will be the announcement of the date of the annual concert by the MacDowell Main Chorus of Pontiac.

Coming again this year under the auspices of the Birmingham Musicale, this chorus will appear Thursday evening, Jan. 23, at 8:30 in the evening for the Musicals' annual conventional meeting.

Coming with the chorus, to appear as piano soloist on this occasion will be Charles Frank, talented pianist of Detroit. Mr. Frank has appeared as soloist with the Noreg Singing society, of Detroit, and the Part Song club of Flint, as well as giving numerous recitals over Detroit radio stations. He is a member of the faculty of the Detroit Institute of Musical Art.

In this program the chorus will sing several works of Edward MacDowell, American composer, for whom it was named 11 years ago.

Frederick A. Protheroe, Birmingham musician, will again be directing the group and at the piano will be Oscar W. Schmidt, who is organist at the First Methodist Church.

The Rev. Herbert Hauser, baritone, will assist the chorus, as he did when this group appeared in Birmingham last year.

Four numbers by MacDowell will open the program: "Piano and the Pilgrims," "Cradle Song," "Dance of the Gnomes" and "From

the Sea." The chorus' second group consists of "Majestic Trees," by Handel; "Sign of Mary," by Diack; and "The Creation," by Richter.

Five numbers by Sir Edward Elgar will include: "Yes! Cast me a Wild Wind," "After Many a Dusty Mile," "Whether I Find Thee" and "Fasting I Watch."

The concluding group of "chorus selections will include "On the Sea" by Buck; "Come to Me" by Cain; "Shenandoah" by Bartholomew and "Life, Death, Eyes" by Logan.

Mr. Frank will offer two groups: "Nocturne" by Schumann; "Valse" by Chopin and "Gnomes" by Liszt. He will also play "Scherzo" by Chopin.

New York Plays Offering Diversion From World Affairs, Lecturer Says

Many theatrical producers in New York this season have taken temporary refuge in the safe harbor of entertainment, amusement and diversion from the tension of world affairs, but only one among them, the Polygraphical company, has essayed courageously that other important function of the theater, the interpretation and clarification of world issues.

Miss Olive Deane Hornell, lecturer for the University of Michigan Extension Service, summed up her impressions of the early theatrical season after having spent a fortnight attending Broadway's most outstanding productions. Miss Hornell spoke Monday afternoon at the Baldwin Public Library, giving the first lecture of her series on contemporary literature and drama, sponsored here by groups interested in establishing a library and reading room for the city.

In the field of comedy, one of two successful revivals is "The Aunt," described as not only fun, but also a play of the most compellingly masculine kind. The entire youthful cast playing the play abundantly and effectively. The other is "Twelfth Night," starring Helen Hayes and Maurice Evans. The beautiful production has been directed by the Theatre Guild by Margaret Webster, whose skill at direction of Shakespearean production is unparalleled in the theatrical world today.
