

YMCA League Games Postponed Until Next Week

Two New Garden Books Added to Baldwin Library

Human nature is such that, it is perhaps not surprising that, with the first really good cold of the year, the amateur gardener begins poring over seed catalogues, dreaming of the possibilities of growing plants and flowers.

Adding and abetting this human weakness, the Baldwin Public Library has added two books to its garden shelves: *House and Garden Plants of Florida*, edited by Richard Wright, and *Compost*, a treatise on the value of organic material of waste materials for planting, cultivation and winter care.

The Pleasant Book of Garden Structures and Devices, by Arthur Johnston, is a practical manual of building design. There are drawings for problem of some kind of garden building, but the emphasis is on the construction of things oneself, without undue expense.

The Home Book, by Dorothy Field, has for its subject house-plant culture. It is a beautiful building. Plans to show how a house can be decorated to most adequately take care of the diverse needs of the modern family.

The Gardener's Picture Book, by Marian Rawson, is a handsome little book of illustrations of innumerable objects, once adjusted to every-day American life, now customary items.

American Craftsmen, by Stuart Williamson, brief histories of the craftsmen of America who solved the problems and supplied the needs of the country.

Miniature Yacht Building, by Thomas Darling, contains directions for building tiny yachts in exact replica of larger ones and, some account of the popular sport of racing miniature yachts.

Modern American Paintings, by Winton Boswell, a collection of plates of some of the finest of American paintings, with explanatory text.

Stories from Home Front, by Anne Shannon Monroe, delightful episodes in the life of a small Oregon town. Written with freshness and appealing charm.

The Day and the Night, by Hart Buck, stories of China, to be read in the afternoon to show the gradual change from some of the old to the new, and the emphasis is on the things that are new, without undue expense.

The Bride Wore White, by Gertrude Woodcock, a beautiful story of a lady in dress, beautiful and beautiful.
