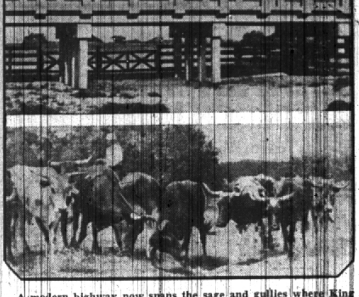

A modern highway now spans the sage and grullies where King Ranch cattle have been herded for 85 years.

HIGHWAY 96, sweeping across the Texas plains from Corpus Christi to Brownsville...

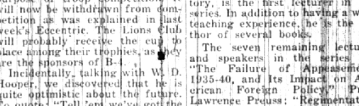
