# "Tea for Two"

Katie Drumm, of Auld Scotia, Tells of Her Friend, Ramsay MacDonald

THE kind of a woman, Katie Drumm is that you recall by her first name the instant you meet her. She's like that, Katie Drumm is.

She's simple, straight forward and the friendliest soul on earth. She knows of everything she has ever done or stood for, and she is proudest of all of her Scotland.

She's proud of the country of her birth, that land of the thistle; she's proud of her three grown children: Susie, Jimmie and Kitty; and she's so very proud of her two grandsons, Mark and Jimmie Reed, who live with her.

The little ones, these Reeds, they don't talk yet but they can get into everything that is within their chubby little arms' reach. But they are impenetrably friendly little monkeys they slide up close to you, their little feet, sleeves with their sticky little hands, even stoop down and try to remove your shoes.

**Little Boy's Mother**  
Just when they are quiet and you think everything is under control they appear on the horizon with strange on their face and over their hands. When their chubby little feet spread far apart, they stand in line and raise what remains of the crange into their hair. I know for I have seen it do.

But the best of all liked the little chickens—who was it that said it—who took half of what remained of his grandmother's Christmas fruit cake, broke it into five sized chunks and loaded it carefully into his dumpy truck that stood in the corner of the dining room.

But this was to have been Katie's story, not the twins'. And so it will be, too.  
Mostly we talked about Ramsay MacDonald, one-time British prime minister, and Katie's life and career by six years ago back in Edinburgh. We had brought back to life with us a conversation Katie had had in Washington 11 years ago to meet England's premier who was making an official visit to the capital.

It's an old story but Katie still tells it as well as if it had happened only yesterday. MacDonald was a guest at the Vincent Massey home—Massey was then Canadian ambassador to the United States when he saw Mrs. Drumm's daughter, Susie, who was employed by a Robinson and I packed my bag and left.

"He walked up and shook hands with her and asked her if she was another?" Susie told him that I was in the States. He must be 25 years old, she said. Mrs. MacDonald answered that her daughter wired me to come to Washington and I packed my bag and left.

**Surprise Appearance**  
Those were probably the most exciting 10 days of her life. Her single suitcase clutched tightly in her hand, Katie arrived at the Washington depot at one o'clock. A bewildered woman, To the Massey's she was hurried, every maid in the household was pressed into action to ready the visitor for her surprise appearance before MacDonald and his entourage.

It was at a large reception that she saw him one again after 25 years. Across the expanse of a dining library, living room and dining room that had been made over for this reception, England's premier viewed her in utter dismay. "Well, Katie," was all that he could say.

## Change Ordinance To Aid Theatre

A second amendment to the Birmingham sign ordinance to fit the needs of the new Bloomfield Theatre was passed by the City Commission last Monday night.

Several months ago, the rule was changed to permit a sign over the sidewalk bearing words showing changes of program. Ordinarily, no sign may extend over the sidewalk.

Then question arose over the same itself, which could have been built without restraining if vertical, the No. Birmingham Theatre sign. However, the new theatre's operators design the signs, "Bloomfield" to be built in "standing block letters a yard high, extending horizontally over the marquee. After considerable debate, the Commission decided that the request should be accepted, and the ordinance was amended.

Drawings for the new marquee, which will be triangular in shape instead of the usual rectangle, were submitted to the Commission Monday night, but no action was taken.
