Alex, said offering us food. Two days later we arrived, with nothing but our clothes and an old loaf of bread so hard we couldn't eat it. It took us 15 days to get to the camp. The 800 miles I had walked.

The worst of the adventure was over. They then took a British troop ship to Bombay. After 12 days in India, we boarded an American ship, the *Garfield* to sail for New York; by way of Cape Town, which they called the "port of call," after leaving terrific heat in Aden and Bombay. The trip here required 22 days.

Submarines No Worry

Sailing through the Atlantic seemed to scare the boats, but not the passengers, it was said. The *Pattens*, the *Patent*, the *Patent*, was nothing at all, for they knew what was meant. Even arrival in New York, they were not afraid. They were feeling emotionally, they are apparently used up.

That night they sailed for a nearby island, Gortio, where they enjoyed a rest. Mrs. Pat took all their clothes to the village fountain for a wash. For two days they rested, hiding in grottos when they were spotted by the enemy. They had their first fresh meat in weeks.

Then they sailed for Alexandria, Egypt, some 500 miles away. Two days they sped along before the fine breeze.

Caught in a Storm

"That's a terrible thing to see and we were blown westward. It rained in torrents and we spent our time battling out the boat with whatever receptacles we could lay our hands on. We had no idea where we were. After two days we met a British fleet, and a destroyer came aboard, giving us our ration of 1500 miles from
