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Work by Cast of "Mr. Pim Passes By" Enhances a Thinly-Proportioned Plot

To a packed house, the Will-O-Way plays directed by William Way Merrill presented the second of the plays for the summer season.

The vehicle chosen for the opening Tuesday evening at the delictual air cooled theatre in Bloomfield Hills was "Mr. Pim Passes By" written by A. A. Milne and having Beatrice Terry and her husband, Geoffrey Marks, and Dr. William Alvord.

It is a piece of one of the foremost English actresses, Dame Ellen Terry, was naturally attracted to this play that is built of a mere wisp of petty gossip for a plot. None but a good cast could bring forth attention from an audience.

This is pure conjecture on the part of the reviewer, but the reason for his having observed that gentle and lonely old man have related many a story of his youth which has younger swashbucklers Jack-like nephews.

The cast of Anne the maid was taken by Barbara Jane Smith, Maud Clemet, as Lady Mauden, the aunt of George, was portrayed by the actress. It is unfortunate that a larger part could not have been assigned to Miss Clemet for her work was much enjoyed.
