Machine tools purchased before the war were signed for by hundreds of new persons are being skidded onto the floor, unhooked and bolted into place, and some of them already are at work.

Temporary Walls Up

"Construction men hardly have put the structural steel and concrete in place before temporary walls of plywood are slapped on to protect the furring from the weather. The plywood will come down when the permanent walls

Part of Huge Program

2,000 Men At Peak

"When completed, the Martin factory will have 5,200,000 square feet of floor space. The company now has more than 2,000 men on its pay roll. When the peak of production is reached, it will have approximately 42,000 employees in the Baltimore plant alone."

MPH Is Top

The cars weigh according to their class, between four and seven thousand pounds, and travel at a rate of speed anywhere from 90 and some odd-tenths miles per hour.

Most of the men racing carry the parts and assemble them. A whole car can be bought, but half the fun is in putting it together in one's own car, they say.

The motors used in the original American cars were the same kind that were used on the model airplanes, but the first built was a built-up, bullet-shaped motor which was somewhat louder. The motors vary according to the engine used around 10,000 R. P. M. The single cylinder two-cycle engines built under the general principle of the British cars used in racing.

The speeds range less than one-half inch in diameter and not over one inch high.
