Gardeners' Corner

Summer Hot Spell
"How, how, how you'll spell, through the summer heat," Merry stick it to it, cheerily do your bit.

And now that the heat is with us, it takes something to stick to it all, let alone doing it cheerily or "merrily." If there is any pleasure in dragging, dirty hoses or hooping rows of vegetables at any time, the whole thing looks pretty black with the thermometer at 90. But the thing to do is to improve more apt to arrive in July than January. Keep cultivating, water thoroughly, and spray when necessary. Cut off dead flower heads as they fall, but after the plants are gone, continue to weed and remove the suckers. Prune your tomato plants for better fruit. Pick back fall blooming cyeansynthians for a time. Don't try to sow grass seed until the fall. Water newly planted shrubs and trees.

Delphinium
Just as the month when the statey spik of the delphinium in their full glory dominate the garden from every vista. All other flowers pale in comparison. To the gardeners, the blooming of his delphinium is perhaps the high point of the garden year. Where the true flower lover who has not stood in awe before the modern hybrid delphiniums in its enormous bouquet—up to four inches in diameter—its solid spikes of bloom in shades of blue, purple, and white fall—the variety of color from royal purple through all the shades of blue to brilliant white. Besides the modern aristocrat the older types look like stately old men.

Unfortunately, relatively few people undertake to grow these newer types and fewer still to raise them from seed. There is a current impression that delphiniums are difficult and the troubles that surround growing them, insurmountable. On the contrary, the possibility of success is greater than with many other plants and even though one gets only a handful of perfect spikes, they will leave their mark on a whole garden.

Americans to the Fore
For years the English hybridizer, Blackmore and Langdon and Watkins Samuel (Wrexham Strain) were sources of the finest delphinium seeds. Now, however, it is generally conceded that the American hybridizers have surpassed them in the purity and strength of their strains. The master of delphinium hybridizers include Vercelle and Bonville (Pack-Hybrids), Lopian (Lyons), Wheelercroft, Hoodwax, and others. When buying seeds, it is advisable to buy directly from the hybridizer. These hand pollinated seeds are expensive, but when one considers the labor and care

Barnum School Has Membership Drop

The Birmingham City school system reported that 84,064 was spent during the past year leaving a balance of \$2,176.17.

In adult education, it was reported that with the cooperation of WPA classes were offered in a variety of subjects, with an enrollment of 108 students. In the U. M. correspondence work, 13 men and 17 women were enrolled in classes. Religious education was successful with 138 pupils participating. The teacher, Mrs. George Lantz, was paid by the Birmingham Council of Churches.

Barnum Drops 43. Barnum membership in Baldwin Place and Quanton Schools had a small increase, while Barnum dropped 43 pupils. Adams school census this year tallied 2,244 persons, or 10 more than last year. There were 1,689 boys and 1,150 girls.

St. Ignace School, St. Ignace, Mich. was supported by the Birmingham Exchange Club, operating half days and treating 158 pupils.

The Hill center and preschool which is supported largely by the Madison Children's Fund of Michigan, 38 children were admitted.

Admission of 34 students were in 1939-40, and the Federal Government paid them \$1,460.80.

The Girl Club at Baldwin Hill conducted their Christmas sale and sold \$54.41 in goods. The sale for crippled children netted \$15.95.

Twenty-five children are aided in the Hill Club vision clinic. In the various club and school groups, 103 children were treated.
