BILLY THE KID—Robert Taylor in a western technicolor film. No review available. THAT EVIL-DOING FEELING—Expert direction of Ernst Lubitch brings to life a light and airy domestic comedy. THE GIRL SCOUTS of Pontiac and Oakland County are enjoying a busy time at the mid-summer camp, situated on Davis Lake, five miles north of Lapeer. There are 100 campers included. The supervision of Camp Sherwood is conducted by Miss Vivian Crowl, director of the camp throughout the year. She is assisted by a trained and experienced staff of volunteer leaders in great part by Betty W. Jones, who has developed a camp which is noted for its impressiveness of candidly programs and Sunday services of Scouts (O.W.). The waterfront is supervised by Grace Wurstovskik, Jane Hater and Joan Robinson. The health of the scouts is under the care of a registered nurse. Junior counselors during the first Brownie period are Betty Jean Young, Virginia LeVine, Roberta Weddie and Ardye Barwash.

THE first three weeks of camp were a give year to scouts between the ages of eleven and seventeen. During the remaining five weeks there are complete units in Little Pines of Brownies, seven to ten years old, while Sailors' Cove houses waterfront campers for two weeks and Mariners for the last three weeks.

THE camp is completely filled for the present summer with ninety-two girls staying with nine to two girls eating dinner in the main dining hall every day. Girls in Greenwood unit cook breakfast and supper in their own new dining hall which has a huge stone fireplace and camp stove.

Handicraft, swimming, and life saving are the daytime activities of the campers, with hikes and scavenger hunts which take them into the surrounding woods. Overnight hikes and meals cooked in the open are special treats. One Sunday was devoted to a huge treasure hunt in which the whole camp participated. Blankets were taken along and rest hour and recreational activities were held under the trees in a spot away from the camp grounds.

CAMPfires on alternate evenings are held in the units and usually find a party in progress in the dining hall. There have been hard dances, a sailors' ball, a patriotic party and a may ball in which the girls participate in both ball room and folk dancing. Outstanding campfire programs have been in the South American manner, a rodeo, an old-fashioned melodrama, the court of the King and Queen of Fairland, and an impressive ceremony in dedication of Wildwood Knob.

THE waterfront unit plans a canoe trip on the Au Sable each two weeks, with this year a dream is realized when the Mariners will embark on a week's cruise aboard a 60-foot schooner on Lake Michigan.
