Cranbrook Gets Indian Picture

Forty volumes which comprise the set of Edward Chase "Cranbrook Indian" is a pictorial and factual record unsurpassed in scope and interest, has recently been given to the Cranbrook Institute of Science by its donors. The books, 20 large quarto volumes of text, 20 smaller illustrated, and 20 folios of large matted photographs, from a collection which was published by private subscription at an original cost of almost \$4,000 per set. They are the result of some 30 years of field work by a gifted photographer whose enthusiasm for his subjects was equalled by his ability to secure superb photographs and to summarize the story of a number of years of exhaustive field work in a special book. Many of the 2000 photographs from the Institute are on display in the Cranbrook Indian exhibit. A book is being prepared to record in color the history of the exhibit. The exhibit is being prepared by Henry S. Hubert, Oscar H. Hunter, H. A. Lee, J. P. McMath and Miss Elizabeth L. Scott. The Institute is rapidly developing its ethnological collections and it is expected that the exhibit in Indian Hall where a number of the baskets of the North American Indian is now being featured.
