Awards Hard to Get

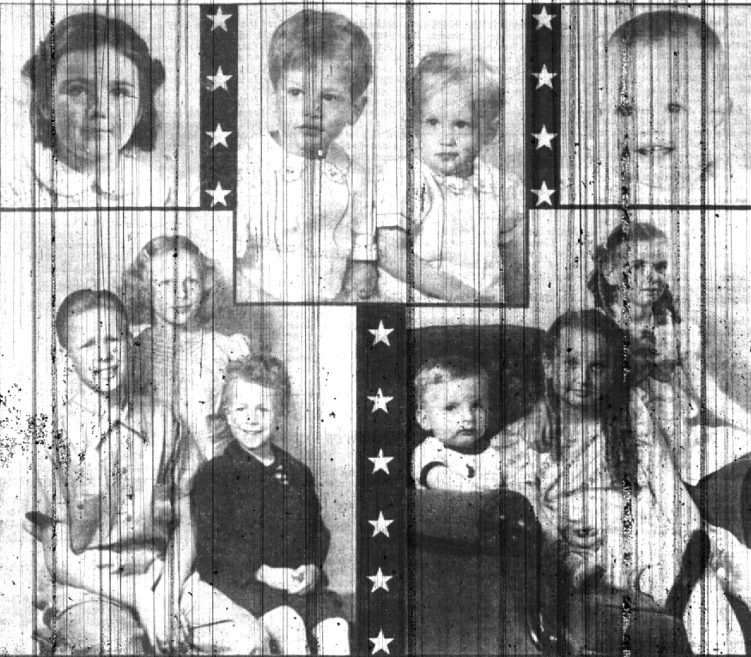
