According to the American Association of University Women, scenes are too painful for children, but the film is all right for adolescents and the family. KIDS ON VAQUERO—Another entertaining episode in the adventures of the outlaw Cisco Kid. The California P. T. A. does not recommend it for children from 8 to 14, says it is adventurous for the rest.

BRIGHT MORNINGS—Story of the early Mormon adventures. No review available. SCOTLAND YARD—With a background of war torn England and a typical fog, a good story for children but all the activities of Scotland Yard. A mystery story clear and entertaining.

HONEYMOON JUNE THREE—An amusing comedy with good direction, a fine musical score and clever acting. For adults and young people as reviewed by the D. A. R. SEEPER WEST—Michael Shayne detective story. Fairly good entertainment. Lively, smoothly directed, with subtle humor and a novel background.
