Dear Mr. Ebert:

Replying to your letter of March 21, we faced a similar problem relative to the erection of a 750,000 gallon elevated steel tank. Our tank was to replace an existing steel tank which was enclosed in a reasonably ornamental masonry structure. The cost of masonry ornamentation, however, with a tank of the size contemplated was found to be almost prohibitive.

The approximate cost of a 750,000 gallon elevated steel tank with ornamental masonry and tubular steel legs 102 feet high was found to be approximately \$40,000. The estimated cost of a tank of similar capacity and height, but enclosed in a masonry structure was found to be approximately \$120,000.

We therefore purchased a piece of ground approximately 120 feet square for the purpose of erecting a public highway, so that the tank property itself would not front on the highway nor use up any valuable street frontage. We elected to place the tank on a 700,000 gallon elevated steel tank above described.

Of this course, there have been some objections. These objections, however, have not been organized. Last Thursday, we had a group of about 25 persons, both men and women, who visited us and inquired directly of the tank as to whether the tank had definitely depreciated the property values in the neighborhood.
