

# Detroit Tuesday Musicales to Cooperate With Local Group In Spring Concert

## Combined Chorus Will Be Feature Of Event April 3

### Alpha Chi Omega Active Alumnae Chapter Installed by Mrs. Adams

A combined chorus of approximately 65 voices will be heard at the annual spring community concert given by the Musicales Chorus of Birmingham at 8:30 p. m. on Thursday, April 3, in the First Baptist Church. The Detroit Tuesday Musicales chorus and string ensemble will cooperate with the Birmingham Musicales in giving this concert.

The program will open with the Birmingham chorus singing a group of folk songs, accompanied by Miss Mildred Green Ector, and directed by Gertrude Heinze Greer. The songs are: "Beside the Cradle," "I Stand," "Bach," "May Day Carol," English folk song; "The Elfin Horn," Swedish folk song; "The Riddle and Flow," Czech-Slovak folk song, with a solo by "Wee-wee Hanna"; and "Hunting in the Robin," Scottish folk song, which also includes a solo to be sung by Janina Bartholomew.

Under the direction of Esther A. V. Johnson the Tuesday Musicales string ensemble of Detroit will present "Suite in the Olden Style," by Arthur Wade. The different parts of the "Suite" are Prelude, Sarabande, Bourree, Adagio, Courante, and Gigue.

All three groups will combine for the final part of the program, "Miserere," an oratorio by Johann Adolph Hasse, an 18th century composer. It is taken from the First Psalm. Gertrude Heinze Greer will direct.

The rendition of "Miserere" in French, Italian and Spanish includes: "God Have Mercy," by the combined chorus; I have Sinned, soprano solo by Georgia Tyson; "For Behold Ye," including the chorus, a duet by Gertrude Heinze Greer and Mildred Spinks; and soprano solo by Ruth Fox, "Baldur Me." A duet by Marjorie Unger and Jean Frothingham; "Pie-O-Lord," soprano solo by Mildred Webster; and the closing number, "O God, O Lord," by the combined chorus.
