Careless Clerks Aid U. of M. Study

ANN ARBOR—Because clerks in the Middle Ages occasionally helped up in keeping their accounts books, the Middle English Dictionary being compiled at the University of Michigan has found many words which otherwise might have been lost.

There are thousands of Middle English account books dealing with farming and other occupations, large numbers of which have been printed in dictionary editor John G. Rose's book, which otherwise might have been lost.

Many of the clerks, however, knew their English better than Latin and slipped in an English word whenever they did not know the correct Latin one. Several thousand pages of these Latin books helped Rose and four thousand English words for physicians and operations.

When the clerks used an English word, they often wrote it in a form which is not recorded in the Middle English Dictionary.

Other dictionaries, which have been in the process of being edited at the University for the past ten years, have collected about 100,000 Middle English words and about 100,000 modern words.

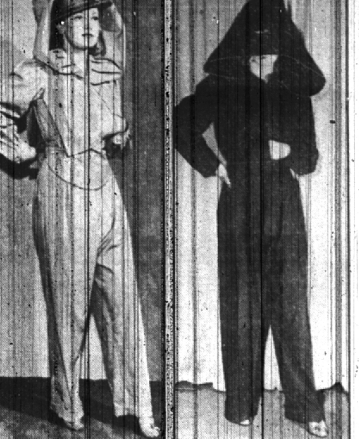

New southern potatoes already are appearing on the market, and scientists give a boost to using what is left of the 1940 crop. As potatoes grow in the south require extensive shipping and cost more at this time of the year. They usually contain a little more water and a little less carbohydrate and mineral salts than the so-called "old potatoes." Here are more points on the value of the potatoes available. At this time of the year they deserve extra credit for their high content of excellent source of lowest vitamin C. Even after storage and no matter how long they are stored, they arrive on the table when potatoes are served. The findings are more than economy in volume, the home economists also point out. Considerable of the minerals such as phosphorus and iron are in or near the skin. So it is economy, in more than one fashion, to make the parings thin, or even better to bake the potatoes and encourage eating the skin with the meaty inside. As an added hint to brides, the best way to avoid lumps in mashed potatoes is to cook thoroughly first, but mash thoroughly when the butter that any milk added is hot.'
