

Club Women Reveal Survey of Household Employee Problems in Birmingham

Hope to Improve Home Conditions For All Concerned

A better "deal" for both employers and employees in the home is the goal of a series of articles in this week's Post. A similar movement has been carried on in Detroit.

"We are not trying to tell anybody what to do," a spokesman told The Post. "We just want to see how things are, and if we can help improve them, we will. We are not trying to tell anybody what to do, but we are trying to give to household employees the results of our survey to everyone concerned."
