

### Says Dishes Rattle When Trucks Go By the Homes on Holland Avenue

Houses quiver when huge trucks pass by on Holland avenue, it was charged in a hearing to the City Commission Monday night when improvement of the street was debated.

Trucks carrying as many as 10 tons of coke, and big oil transporters makes the dishes rattle on the houses, one resident declared, asking, "What's the use of improving the street if the trucks are going to pound it to pieces?"

Holland avenue is the only through route to the coal yards and oil depot at the railroad, except the longer route via East Maple avenue. City trucks going to the warehouse also make constant use of it.

Improvement would consist of tipping, but present plans and grades and rebuilding with six inches of gravel or a new grade. Asphalt on the surface would be applied making a semi-permanent blacktop surface guaranteed to last for five years and probably much longer. Cost was estimated at \$3000 or 97 cents per front foot, which the city's large would bear about one-fifth, or \$610.

The project was finally approved, and the Commission voted the need for load limit restrictions in the spring and control of the speed of trucks.
