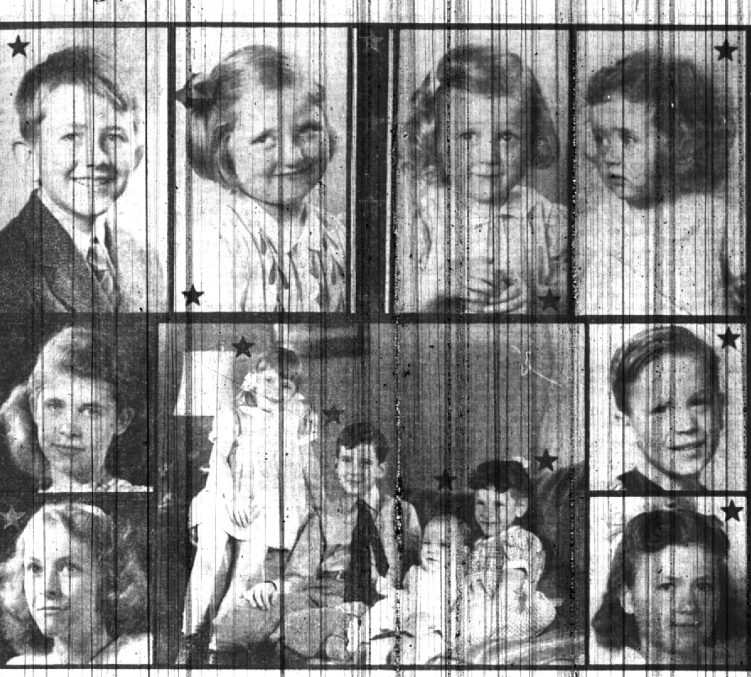

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"Migratory Camps in Michigan" is the topic of discussion for the League of Women Voters when they meet on Monday, May 19 at 1:30 p. m. Mrs. Franklin Stearns, of Detroit, is to be the principal speaker.

After receiving specialized college training in social service studies, Mrs. Stearns was associated with the Y.W.C.A. and later through the Episcopal Diocese of Michigan, aided in training workers along social service lines.

Early in March, Mrs. Stearns attended the hearing before the Senate Committee on Rules and Regulations, on the question of whether Michigan should or should not have Federal Migrant Camps. Some very interesting sidelights developed at the hearing.

The proposed camps, which would be under the Federal Social Administration, are desirable in view of health alone. Mrs. Stearns will tell the League the why and wherefores of the camp situation.

The business meeting will be at 1:30 p. m. at the Community house, followed by the speaker and open discussion at 3:30 p. m. The meeting, as a membership in the League, is open to all women interested.
