Birmingham Takes Third Place at State Track Meet

Capturing third place with a squad of seven men, East Lansing gained 2 1/2 points to trail East Lansing, winners, with 45 points and Three Rivers, second, 22 1/2, last Saturday at the thirty-fifth annual track and field meet of lower Michigan. They competed in Class B.

The Maples were paced by Jack Steelman, who ran in the money in the 100- and 200-yard sprints on the relay team. In scoring ten of the Maples' points, Steelman was followed by Miller, the East Lansing sprinter, all day. Jack fleet took a second in the 100 and a third in the 200, while Three Rivers took both tracks.

Both Birmingham and East Lansing had the same plan of attack for the meet; both teams strove in their dash men and the field events. East Lansing, defending champion, had a very experienced dashman, its record-breaking pole-vaulter, a fine broad-jumper and a solid relay team. Three Rivers had an all-around balanced team, taking at least a point in every event.

East Lansing had a squad of 12 men, Three Rivers, eight, and Birmingham, seven. In the broad jump, Olson failed to qualify, while Joe Armstrong took seventh place, losing both trials by a quarter of an inch. Armstrong injured his knee and failed to qualify in his heat of the 200-yard dash because of the injury. Bob Cole lost out in the 100-yard dash but took a fifth place in the 200.

John Pilkington won 11 feet three inches to tie for fourth place in the 440-yard dash, losing by a hair to three Rivers. Olson failed to place higher than third. Dick was boxed in in his race up the final stretch where he came up from a sixth position to third. The time of 54 seconds has been bettered by Gilbert several times.

Pilkington, Cole, Steelman and Gilbert ran the relay in the very fast time of 1:38.4.

Press vs. Radio Debate Continues

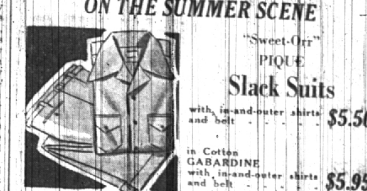
The debate groups of the Speech I class have begun debating the question: "Is the paper more influential than the radio?"
