## Institute of Science To Sponsor Trip to Lake Erie Islands

Drowned rivers, ancient snags, glacial grooves and Indian pictographs cut in rock will be explored by a geological excursion to Lake Erie islands in early June, sponsored by the Cranbrook Institute of Science, and led by Dr. George M. Stanley, Department of Geology, University of Michigan and Research Associate at the Institute.

The party will meet early Saturday afternoon, June 14, and drive to Toledo and Catawba, Ohio, with several stops en route to view the effects of post-glacial tilting about the west end of Lake Erie.

By Boat  
From Catawba the group will go to Put-in-Bay by boat, spend the night and have breakfast at a hotel. Sunday morning will be given to a tour of South Bass Island; the afternoon to a special boat trip to Kelley's Island to see Indian pictographs on limestone are now gradually disappearing, and to view the world famous glacial grooves where prospecting ice of the last glacial period made deep furrows in the bed rock. Crystal gaves will also be viewed.

If you will, we can be jammed down anybody's throat in a revolution, nor will it come about unless the changing economic system, it will come more slowly than that, and as it comes it will be a change in the men and his that takes place. ## Gardeners' Corner

Workout for the Week-end  
Cut bitoms of lines as they fade. Bushes and shrubs have grown in an ugly shape should be cut back now. Don't delay, you will be cutting next year's growth.

Sprays with lime-sulfur: phloxias, delphiniums, hollies; also: beech leaves sprayed with lime-sulfur dust (9 parts sulphur, 1 part arsenate of lead) either mixed with your own purchase, or buy it set down in ground around trees with a fine mesh netting or paper or faithful cultivating. These sprays are watered during dry spells; be sure the water soaks to a foot at least.

Sprays apply with a nozzle spray and cover them with an alternate of lead. Look for signs of insects, especially aphids, once a week as the plants grow.

Plant dillias. Some top of the tuber should come out, if possible, but not the root. If the pot is not outdoors in the soil, they will make more wintering for the next year.

Window Boxes  
Prepare window boxes carefully. Shelves will depend on your work habits and soil. See that there is sufficient drainage, that the soil has some sand and some peat moss, and that it is loose to hold moisture. Choose your plants to suit your location.

Fast plants to start. English ivy, geraniums, and geraniums. For sun use geranium, lantana, oleander, geranium, gladiolus, petunias, marigolds, nasturtium, verbena, lily, lily-of-the-valley, lily-of-the-valley, lily-of-the-valley.
