

**Theatre Most Sensitive of Arts**  
**Miss Hormel Says in Last Lecture**

"Since theatre is the most sensitive of the arts," Miss Deane Hormel said Monday in her opening lecture of the Season's "Theatre of Tomorrow," eighth and last lecture of the University of Michigan extension department's contemporary literature and drama, "the discerning theatergoer may always expect in it the things that trends of the day will be like the holiday theatre," Miss Hormel continued, "when those of escapism and entertainment predominated, therefore the recent Broadway productions plainly reflect the sick world of today, but they may take heart from the fact that they also reflect a basic determination to restore that world to health, and to a sounder one than before, which cannot so readily be corrupted and undermined."

"Vigilantly sustaining the gracious tradition of the theatre of an earlier generation is Katharine Cornell's beautiful production of Bernard Shaw's 'The Doctor's Dilemma,' the season's most brilliant revival. Miss Cornell's production is a galaxy of brilliant acting, including Raymond Massey, Bramwell Fletcher, Colin Clive, John Humphrey, Cecil Humphreys, Gertrude Lawrence, and Whitford Kane, whose suave and dandy acting is an effective offset for her glamorous beauty in period costume. The scene by Donald Crisp never was so handsome as the theatre in recent years."

"It sharp contrast to this is Orson Welles' brilliant production of Richard Wright's recent best-selling novel, 'Native Son' as dramatized by another brilliant actor, Paul Green. By a veritable orchestration of light, color, and sound, blended into the tonic of a medieval brown brick wall and variegated lighting, produced by the brilliant use of a camera, the tragedy of Bigger Thomas is portrayed as a cumulative intensity that becomes an unforgettable experience in theatre," Miss Hormel said. "Canals like the role of Bigger leads an excellent cast in a very fine performance which is an eloquent plea for more education and understanding of the victims of social maladjustment."

Miss Hormel saw the opening of William Saroyan's new play, "The Beautiful People," which she described as a very pleasant play to see for its candor and whimsy, but not otherwise remarkable in retrospect. This play she characterized as the most successful of all efforts to put a body in drama, the basic human problems presented by Nazi aggression and the resistance to the eloquent appeal to resistance.
