

# Thanksgiving is the Theme of Garden Club Meeting

The Conservation and Education Committee of the Garden Club sponsored the meeting Monday afternoon, summarizing their activities. The spirit of Thanksgiving was most evident, as indeed it should be at this time of the year and in these times of worldwide emergency.

Across the front of the auditorium a low fence enclosed a vegetable garden in miniature. Rows of plants which are being grown by the Birmingham High School science classes under the direction of Miss Frances Looney. This exhibit typified the summer project of individual gardens of high school students which Mrs. J. J. Reilly, chairman of the Education Committee, directed in cooperation with Miss Looney. Mrs. W. C. Howe also assisted with this exhibit, as co-chairman.

Miss Mabel R. Smith, Home Extension Agent of Oakland County, and the 4-H Club also demonstrated the practical side of conservation for National Defense with their exhibit of canned fruits and vegetables, needwork, home-made rugs and other articles.

There was a Tree and Winter Feeding of Birds exhibit, directed by Mrs. Craig Reilly and Mrs. Drayner Allen. Mrs. Howard Hagerly furnished goods. This came under the heading of Conservation of Wild Life.

At the fireplace in the auditorium, a perfectly fascinating old-fashioned kitchen, carrying out the Thanksgiving scene of early American days, had been set up by Mrs. Elmore Wofford. Many of the antiques used in this had been loaned by Mrs. Jacob Manning and Mrs. H. Viter Spink.

Mrs. Ewald Schaeffer was in charge of the meeting and introduced the speaker of the afternoon, C. J. Tinker who was substituting for Mr. Walter Hastings, head of the Photographic Division of the state Conservation Department, who at the last moment had been unable to attend.

Mr. Tinker showed several reels of motion pictures illustrating the training and abilities of the state's 130 to 140 Conservation Officers (no longer called game wardens), who are holding back all destructive forces so that this State can be passed on to future generations in better condition than when taken over. He helped as well as inspectors. He measures fish for minimum size, but he can also advise on the kind of bait to use and better locations for fishing. In all lines of his work it is the same. He is able to give help where help is needed.
