

# Birmingham Parent-Teacher Associations to Unite for Membership Drive

### Governor Issues Proclamation to Support Drive

A city-wide drive for membership in the various Birmingham Parent-Teacher Association units is to be carried on next week, Oct. 5 to 12. A similar program is being carried on throughout Michigan.

"Parent-Teacher" Associations in Birmingham are interested in all children and youth of this community," according to Mrs. Roy H. McCutcheon, president of the city P. T. A. council, through their memberships in the Michigan Congress of Parents and Teachers and the National Congress, she continued. "Our associations have the opportunity to participate in a nationwide program concerning the needs and interests of all children."

"During the coming week, local associations have their objective of enrolling all parents, teachers, and any adults interested in parent-teacher purposes and programs," the council president said in explaining the local program. "In this way, to each individual will be secured a representative, active, and continuing membership in recognition of the Parent-Teacher Association work of Governor Murray D. Van Wagner has issued the following explanation.

"The Parent-Teacher Association through their program of work have stimulated in the child the well being of our children and in an organized way to each individual to participate in a statewide and nationwide program of development of the youth in each local community. To each individual parent, membership in such an association is an opportunity to share in the child's school life and to gain an appreciation of the problems of the teachers whose influence is in our national culture is so far reaching.

"Therefore, in accordance with annual custom, I, Murray D. Van Wagner, Governor of Michigan, hereby designate the period of Oct. 5 to 12, inclusive, 1931, as Membership Enrollment Week for the Michigan Congress of Parents and Teachers, and I urge that all citizens give thought in this period to the advantage of membership in this organization and that each local organization in the observance of this week in every possible manner."
