The Ypsilanti team, which is under the leadership of Eddie Shadford, a new and untired coach at Ypsilanti this year, has lost its first two games to the strong and experienced teams of Ann Arbor and Lincoln Park by the scores of 7-0 and 6-0, respectively. These were hard-fought battles and it is believed that the blue and gold may have a very good chance of taking the Twin Valley league championship this year.

This year will be the third season for Birmingham in the league, therefore the Maples are very anxious to retain their crown a third year.

In the last two years, Birmingham has been undefeated in league competition and has lost one arm and two of its outside guards.
