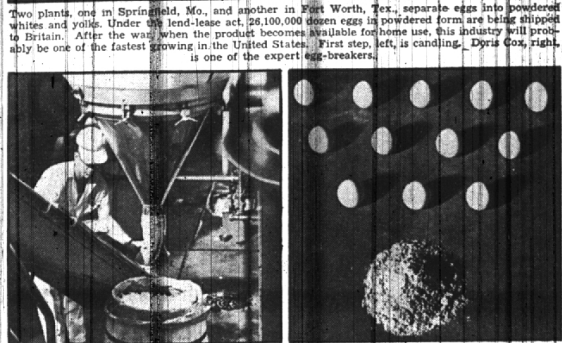
Schools Participate In Fire Prevention

Water Bath Method
And for those of you who use your own film, you will keep these highlights from looking up, and would like to retain more detail in your black and white developing the "water bath" way. Also Adams taught us the trick while in Detroit a month ago. The process involves developing your film in your standard developer (F-10, D-19, or D-19) using trays. After two minutes in developer, switch your film to a tray of pure water—same temperature as your developer—keep film in water for 15 to 30 seconds, and back into your developer and back to the "water bath" until your negative is fully developed. It's a cinch with this film as you can work under your red darkroom light. For Panoramatic film you will first have to develop your negative after which you can "water bath" under a dark room light.—William No. 3. We've tried it, and it works. Gradation is lovely to behold.
