Residents Here Reveal Advantages Of Planned Recreation Programs

Lloyd Chapman, director of summer recreation for two seasons and teacher in the high school, never before in the history of the world has its inhabitants had so much leisure. Three people have to be educated so that they can use that leisure profitably—just as they have to be educated to prepare for a life's vocation. It seems to me that we must put first things first. We must provide recreational facilities for young and old in our town just as we provide educational facilities. It doesn't do any good to be able to do almost anything if it is either the city or the Board of Education, it is a community problem and it must be solved. We have wonderful facilities available here in Birmingham, and we are not using them. We cannot seem to find the money to run them, so we have to build new ones. Thousands of dollars are now being spent which are beneficial only to a community that is limited as to its own round ability. When will we learn to put things first?

John K. Ormond, president of the Birmingham Y. M. C. A., says:

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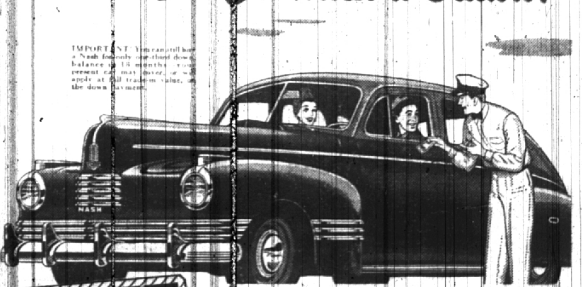
