The first quarter opened with a bang when the Maples took the lead on a 10-yard pass from Kelly to Armstrong.

After a series of line plunges and off-tackle smashes by Kelly to full-back, which overcame the Ypsilanti one-yard strip, Armstrong scored on a quarterback sneak; Kelly kicked the extra point.

Another deep drive by the Maples and a quick kick by Armstrong to full-back took it to its own 11 yard line.

With only a few minutes to go in the game, Birmingham intercepted one of Ypsilanti's passes and reached the Ypsilanti 20. However, Ypsilanti successfully blocked the scoring attempt and the game ended 13-0.

The game was marked by the spirited playing of Paul Kelley, whose speed and alertness brought several scoring opportunities to the boys. Another star performance is credited to full-back Bob Carnahan who worked through the Ypsilanti line for repeated gains.
