Digging a big crop of potatoes. The average yield here in Michigan is about 100 bushels, and on some farms it has reached 200 bushels per acre.

What state of all the forty-eight has the highest average in white potatoes? 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Furloughs
Now that the greatest peacetime manuevers in Army history have been concluded, troops are being granted enlisted men 30 days of furlough a year, it was announced today at Fort Sheridan, Ill. Joseph M. Cummins, commanding the Sixth Corps Area with headquarters in Chicago, said that during periods immediately following manuevers, any soldier in an organization may be authorized furloughs at one time. At other times, the 15 percent now authorized by regulations will not be exceeded. Furloughs will not be granted while operations are on manuevers, but to individuals who are undergoing training in replacement training centers, and officer candidate schools, except that emergency furloughs may be authorized at any time.
