

W. C. T. U. Enjoys Unexpected Revival Because of War Clouds, Says Alleman

LANSING—The Women's Christian Temperance Union, crusader for prohibition since 1874, is enjoying an unexpected revival because of war clouds, says Gene Alleman, W. C. T. U. secretary.

Just as World War I afforded Congress an opportunity in December, 1917, to launch the noble experiment while several million men were in military camps and industrial plants were striving for utmost efficiency, so the present emergency is being met by 600,000 members of the W. C. T. U. as an economic reason for curbing the use of drink.

If we must tighten our belts and deprive ourselves of "non-essentials," there is liquor, beer, wine and liquor is bound to bob up. Whether these commodities are "non-essential" depends upon each citizen's idea of personal liberty, personal health, national security and the like.

Dickinson

A situation such as this is made-order for ex-Governor Lauenroth of Michigan, who is charged with the duty of determining what is to be done with the liquor problem.

Since departing from the governor's office, Lauenroth has been doing some lecturing. He went to Florida, stopping over at Kromeau, Fla., in Georgia, long enough to chat with Ex-Governor Chase S. Osborn, and soon he is expected to give a Hearst newspaper man containing glowing words about the necessity of having a strong prohibition law.

"At the Grand Rapids convention of the W. C. T. U., Dickinson reiterated the conviction that the world's problems could be quickly solved by prayer and suggested that the only solution would be needed after all was just an old-fashioned prayer meeting at the Washington Hotel or elsewhere in Washington.

While even Dickinson would probably qualify his statement in a practical way, as it would take a lot more than a prayer meeting to solve the liquor problem, it is a fundamental truth of the uprising beyond moral dispute. Dickinson has always been right, and even his critics yield to his resignation. "You can't argue with God."

Keeping Out of War

The W. C. T. U., like almost every body else in Michigan, is greatly concerned in whether we can stay out of this war.

The white-ribboned mothers do not want their sons to drink. They also don't want their sons to go to war. There is probably no church group in Michigan so devoted to the cause of peace as the W. C. T. U. They have a firm determination that is kindred to their moral zeal for the good luck-wise. They would be among the first to command President Wilson to keep us out of this war.

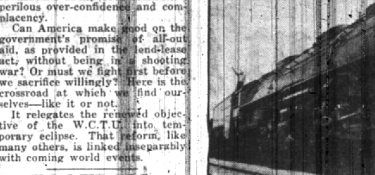

Hendrick Defines 'Casual Labor'

Because many persons do not understand the meaning of the word "casual labor," Hendrick, manager of the Social Security Board's field office in Pontiac, today issued the following statement:

"The Social Security Act provides that a casual laborer, in the course of the employer's trade or business, shall not count toward the insured person's record. However, any work which advances or promotes the business of the employer is not counted as casual labor, no matter how small the job is or how little time it takes. For example, work performed by a carpenter who is employed by a storeowner to build an addition to the store, to put in shelves or to do some other job in connection with the store is not casual labor because this work does advance or promote the storeowner's business.

"Work for a corporation is never 'casual labor' even though it is occasional, incidental or irregular, because a corporation has no authority to employ anybody for work which does not advance or promote its business. In other words, no work for a corporation can be 'casual labor.'
