

# Razzle-Dazzle Play Gives Peoples Victory Over Grosse Pointe

## Birmingham Wins 7-0 in Season's Opening Contest

Scoring early in the fourth period on a 70-yard run by Paul Kelley, Birmingham defeated a startled and weary Grosse Pointe team 7-0, for the first victory of the year last Saturday afternoon at Grosse Pointe after three grueling quarters in scorching sunshine.

Grosse Pointe, just below Mt. Clemens and Ann Arbor last year in the state rankings, was surprised when Birmingham pulled a combination end around lateral pass play that involved three laterals and went for a score. The play came four minutes after the start of the fourth quarter when the ball was snapped to halfback Dick Kelso, who immediately lateraled to blocking-back Bill Gelling.

**Another Lateral**  
The ball was then passed to left end Hank Dahlquist, who came around behind the line of scrimmage and flipped a lateral to Kelley, who headed for the sideline and then cut back to the middle and picked up his interference for the 70 yard jump. Kelso also converted for the extra point.

Birmingham kicked off to start the game which got down to hard fighting for three complete quarters. After receiving the ball on their 35 yard line, the Blue Devils went to the 'Maples' 40 yard line in six downs. After an incomplete pass the ball went to Birmingham, which gained a first down in two tries by Hopkins. Then gaining another first down, Kelley attempted a pass that was intercepted by Grosse Pointe on their own 41.

Trying to make their downs, Weaver, of Grosse Pointe, quickly kicked to the 'Maples' 30 where the ball was downed. After a slight gain by Carrahan, Hopkins took the ball to the 50 yard line for a first down.

**Second Quarter**
