

Men in Service

Editor's Note: Men in the armed forces, and parents are invited to send the names of the boys' whereabouts and how they are getting on in the country, are hungry for news of their friends. Even the address of a newly-placed inducted man is of interest.

Enlisted Men Released
In line with the policy of the War Department to build and bolster the efficiency of the United States Army for National Defense, and at the same time work a little hardship as possible on the enlisted men of the Army, plans were completed today for the release of approximately 2,000 men between Sept. 22 and Jan. 1, 1942, in the Sixth Corps Area, it was announced today by Major General Joseph M. Cummings, commanding the Corps Area with headquarters in Chicago.

Approximately 200,000 men will be released from service throughout the country during the remainder of this year, according to figures previously released by the War Department. It is expected that the first men to be released in the Sixth Corps Area states of Illinois, Wisconsin and Michigan will be their respective states prior to Sept. 30, General Cummings said.

Orders Released
Soldiers who desire release from the Army, and who are eligible under the authorized categories and priorities may make application for the termination of their military service to their unit commanders. Those men desiring such release must submit written application on their own initiative for it.

General Cummings said that these men can and will be released without the military efficiency of any of the units of the Army in the Sixth Corps Area being greatly lowered.

Within the number authorized, release from active duty will be made in the following priorities after making due allowance for the death, disability, dishonorable discharge, and other unavoidable causes.

Hardship and dependency cases, when properly established, is regarded as probable that there will be less than 200 men in this category in the Sixth Corps Area.

Men enlisted for three years in the Regular Army and men enlisted for one year in the Army of the United States at the expiration of their term of enlistment. Those who desire and are qualified for re-enlistment will be re-listed in the Regular Army and will not be included in quotas for release.

Selective Service and National Guard enlisted men who request release from active duty in writing and who had attained their 28th birthday on or prior to July 1, 1941, and prior to their induction in the order of length of active Federal Service. Such men will not be required to complete one year of active duty.

4-H Classification
A new classification has been introduced into the Selective Service. It is 4-H and it is given to men who were 28 years of age or older on July 1, 1941. These men, of course, are deferred.

Bloomfield, and a class for the Royal Oak Big Beaver, Birmingham, Novi and Pontiac.
