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Gardeners' Corner

HOUSE PLANTS
Less call for bringing in plants set that for the summer. Local shows are beginning to show many things that start in indoor plants. Plan something new. Plant fruit trees in the fall. They will have time to establish roots before winter.

PRUNING
Prune your trees and shrubs in the late fall or early winter.

SOIL CARE
Take care of your soil. Add fertilizer and compost to keep it fertile.
