Saarinen's Swanson Work Is Reviewed In New Magazines

The Architectural Forum for August carries a section of 14 pages featuring, with text and illustrations, the design School, Waukegan, Illinois, by Elio and Eero Saarinen, associated with Perkins, Wheeler & Will, architects.

In a comment, Joseph Hudnut says, "It is rather only one of the many affirmations of that liberating spirit which is making the art of teaching (the greatest of all arts) articulate in the art of architecture; but it is an affirmation clear resolute and persuasive. An inventive activity has shaped this arresting building. Especially I like the hospitable lobby and that central assembly room which so stealthily gathers the children into its arms; and as for the classrooms, they are, I think, as perfect as they could be made."

In the same issue is an interesting house "Four Bedrooms, Maid's Room, Four Baths, Breakfast Room" in Grosse Pointe Farms, Michigan, by J. Robert F. Swanson architect.

Pencil Points for Aug. carries 21 pages on "A Study in Contrasting Styles" out Government buildings in Washington, using as examples the recently completed National Gallery of Art by John Russell Pope, Eggers & Higgins, architects, and the proposed Smithsonian Gallery of Art, a modern design by Elio & Eero Saarinen and J. Robert F. Swanson. Of this Lorimer Rich says "I like public architectural

If we were to discontinue the soil treatment it would be a very short time until this insect would be so numerous that it would be impossible for our citizens to produce gardens and crops in your area.

"We ask your cooperation in supplying us with enough acreage of land at an early date in order that we can make the soil treatment immediately. Our Mr. McManis is expecting to contact you promptly, and he reports that it will take some 1500 pounds to complete this soil treatment program."

Economy Ideas In New Homes

Since economy is one of the chief goals in both new building and modernization, the Federal Housing Administration's Federal Home Loan Bank Board is currently contemplating new homes or modernizing their older ones.

One of the most important items in this list is plumbing fixtures to avoid an excessive amount of piping, obtained by planning the kitchen and bathroom back to back when both rooms should be located in the house contains a utility room which includes laundry trays, this room should be located adjacent to the kitchen and the bathroom.

Location of the hot-water storage tank and heater close to fixtures requiring hot water will result in economy of piping, quantity of water used, heat loss from piping, and fuel required to heat the water.

In two-story houses, basement laundry, kitchen and bathroom should be placed approximately over each other.

The concentration of plumbing lines the installation can be made with a minimum amount of labor and materials.

Construction Economies

Many economies are possible in construction. Costs of building depend primarily upon the shape of the structure, use of stock materials, and simplicity with which the structural shell is framed.

The shape of the house is important due to the amount of outside wall and roof area required to close a given amount of space.

The square is by far the most economical shape, since it provides the maximum amount of floor area with the least amount of wall area. Corner construction costs more than straight-wall construction, with the result that square and rectangular-shaped plans are, less costly than L, U, or Z shapes.

Sand Dune Areas To Be Purchased

Three sand dune land acquisition projects sponsored by the Department of Agriculture have been approved by Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard. It was announced today by J. S. Cutler of Dutton, Ohio, regional conservator and the Agriculture Department's Soil Conservation Service.

It is proposed to acquire approximately 6,840 acres in the North Muskegon district, 3,400 acres in the South Muskegon district, and 21,860 acres in the West Ottawa district. When purchased, the active sand dunes are to be stabilized for the protection of nearby lands and property, and developed for productive forestry purposes. Cutler said.
