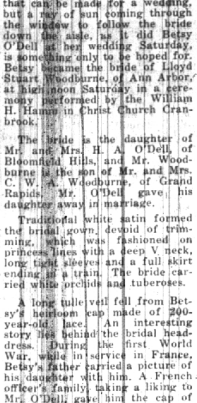
Following the ceremony a reception was held at the bride's home, after which the bridal couple left for an Eastern trip. On their return they will live in Royal Oak.

Wendt-Stephenson Escorted Satin Bridal Gown Kingswood Has 5 New Instructors



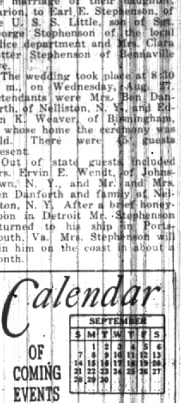
