

## Majority Controls Gov'rner, Minority Elects Legislature

A majority of the people electing the governor, but a minority elected the state legislature, makes Moore, executive secretary of the Oakland Citizens League, told the Exchange Club Tuesday.

Citing the last state election as an example, Moore pointed out that the majority wanted and elected Gov. Van Wagner, but that the people who voted for the defeated gubernatorial candidate elected the men who control the legislature.

"This may be a serious thing," he said, "especially in war time when things must be done quickly." But for the present situation is the fact that Michigan is divided into legislative districts on a basis of the 1920 census, and that thus, people in the populous centers are better represented.

The Constitution calls for reapportionment of the districts every 10 years but the legislature refused to call it up to the State Constitution. A popular referendum on this issue will be voted on November 3.

The familiar stock argument against reapportionment is the charge that the rural districts are honest, the city people corrupt. But, therefore, the rural districts ought to be in control, Moore declared.

"That is a myth. No one ever proved it. Just last week there was another similar attempt in Rose Township of Oakland County. In the big cities, dishonesty is brought out because they are grand juries which go after it."

Moore pointed out that under the proposed reapportionment the rural areas would control the legislature, although Wayne has half the state's population. Wayne would get 33½ per cent of the districts, and 33½ per cent of the county would be divided into districts so that the more conservative elements would get representation.

Oakland County would get five representatives in contrast to the two men now elected. At the present, each man represents 127,000 people in Oakland County, while in the northern part of the state, each man represents an average of 18,000 to 19,000 people.

## Say Timber Wolves Won't Hurt Humans

MUNISING.—A pair of timber wolves whose trail was observed recently by conservation department game men in the Munising area is believed to be the same pair that in recent winters worked the Piney Creek area several times. Once found a wolf "beat" that ran from Munising to Grand Marais, roughly a round trip of 40 miles.

Recent reports of lone Canadian trappers who encountered large packs of timber wolves northeast of Winnipeg and escaped hunting noted with interest here as suggesting the return of Michigan game men, that these animals will not attack humans in the woods.

One of the Canadian trappers

encountered a wolf pack of 15 animals while working a frozen lake to his cabin, and shot nine of them. Later, a fellow-trapper of the same district encountered the remainder of the pack, brandished a club at them, and got away unharmed.
