

Treasured Objects of Art Donated for Save the Children Federation's Auction

Contributions From Residents Listed Herewith

A veritable treasure room was Mrs. Angus D. McLaughlin's library this week, for in it she has stored all of the valuable antiques and works of art donated by Birmingham and Bloomfield residents for the auction sale being sponsored by the "Save the Children Federation." Proceeds from this sale will go toward establishing and maintaining nursery schools in defense areas in order that mothers who have small-children may be available for work in defense factories.

Owners have parted with great many rare and precious treasures of art for this cause. Typical of the donor was expressed by Mrs. H. A. O'Dell in the following note accompanying her contributions: "These perfume bottles belonged to my great aunt, Anne Norman, an English girl who came in a French convent, but escaped during the revolution. These came with her as did, also, the jet cross and earrings. They have laid put away as treasures, but sentiment today is so secondary that I am sure they would like to be thrived again in the comfort of some worthwhile cause."

Many Works of Art Given
David Redenthal, "The Sea-Sick Sailor," one of the first of his works to be published in a newspaper was given by Mrs. Martin L. Butzel. Mrs. Clyde L. Hagaman sent in a series of 14th century music engraved in glass.
