The drive will begin April 28, the 19th anniversary of the founding of the Community House.

Here are the rules for the contest:

- (1) Contestants must be of junior or senior high school age and must live in Birmingham or the immediate vicinity.
- (2) Contestants must write their name and address on the back of the poster.
- (3) The grade in school of the contestant must be written on the lower right front of the poster.
- (4) All posters must be turned in at the Community House not later than April 21.
- (5) Prizes will be awarded as follows: 1 group for senior high school students and 1 group for junior high school students. In each group, there will be a first prize of \$5; a second prize of \$3; and a third prize of \$2. Defense stamps will be given to those gaining honorable mention.
- (6) The decision of the judges will be final. They are Mrs. Charles T. Beals, Mrs. Beecher Compton and Mrs. Thomas L. Thurler.

Posters will be displayed in various store windows and at the Community House.

For the second time in the history of the Johnson Memorial Award, a double winner was announced. Jo Armstrong and Paul Kelley receiving the honors in the twelfth annual selection.

The winners represent two of the greatest athletes ever to come out of Baldwin. Ever since he entered Baldwin three years ago, Kelley has been one of its most spirited and naturally talented athletes. Always known as a fighting but sportsmanlike player, he has won seven letters in football, basketball and baseball as well as captaining the football and basketball squads. He will undoubtedly win a baseball letter this season.

Paul has also worked on Publications, editing Baldwin's part of the school yearbook program and serving on the sports staff of the '42 Paper.

Jo is also a veteran of three sports, having won seven letters in football, basketball and track. He will win another letter in basketball this year.
