Some New Ideas for Jaded Appetites

No matter how much we like to cook, it becomes tiresome when we have to prepare three square meals a day. It is then that we turn to something new; if it isn't new foods, we can at least try serving the old ones in a new way. Make use of your extra cooking appliances, the toaster and waffle iron. There are numbers of savory sandwiches which when toasted seem much more of a meal than just a plain sandwich. Try serving them with a hot gravy or sauce. Try to make your food interesting, give every dish one preparing a little personal touch.

Spaghetti and Ham Souffle
1 can spaghetti with tomato sauce
1 cup diced ham
4 tablespoons butter
1/2 cup tomato soup
2 eggs
Cook the flour and butter till creamy, add the tomato soup. When thick, remove from the fire, add the spaghetti, ham and beaten eggs. Place the saucepan over a low flame and bake in a moderate oven for 20 to 40 minutes. Serve with a sauce made from additional soup.

Hot Baked Cheese Sandwich
6 tablespoons mayonnaise
1 cup pickles, finely chopped
1 cup cold chicken, diced
12 baking powder biscuits
Blend together the mayonnaise and chopped pickle and chicken. Spread the mixture between the baking powder biscuits, split and buttered while hot. Serve while the biscuits are hot. Garnish with stuffed olives in crisp lettuce leaves.

Hot Biscuit Chicken Sandwich
12 slices bread
3 lb. American cheese
3 eggs
2 cups milk
2 tablespoons shortening
2 tablespoons flour
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon pepper
Trim the bread and toast it. Make a cream sauce of the last five ingredients, cool slightly and add the beaten eggs. Lay half the toast in a shallow baking pan with half the cheese sliced thin on top. Pour over this the milk and egg mixture and cover with the remaining toast and cheese. Press down the toast into the egg mixture until the edges are submerged, but not the cheese. Set the pan in hot water and bake in an oven here.

Citizenship Day Set for May 17
Due to the present emergency, it is impossible to continue Oakland County Citizenship Day as in the past. However, the President is still asking that this day be celebrated. Accordingly a program has been worked out with county leaders that emphasizes Americanism, that should stimulate public morale, and that at the same time will carry on the tradition of an annual Citizenship Program.
Instead of having a ceremony inducting new citizens, the program this year will commemorate citizenship itself. The idea is to educate the type of thing a patriotic citizen can actually do now.
One part of the program will consist of three high school students who through elimination contests will have won \$25 defense bonds by speaking on American citizenship. Another part of the program will consist of a "Junior" citizenship induction of a soldier, sailor and a marine. There will also be a presentation of the colors in a marching music, and a speaker.
