

Citizenship is Theme of Oakland County Federation Meeting Here Tomorrow

Good Neighbor Policy Subject of Lecture By Miss Olive Hormel

Because of the recent shift in centers of economic interest from the Far East to South America, "Understanding Our Good Neighbors," the lecture to be given by Miss Olive Hormel as seventh in the University of Michigan extension series on "The New Books and Plays," is of more than usual interest.

Though Miss Hormel will mention books dealing with our "good neighbors" in other parts of the world, she will of course stress the new material on the nations in this hemisphere. The lecture will be given at two o'clock, Monday afternoon, April 13, at the Baldwin Public Library. The series is sponsored here by St. Catherine's Guild.

Among the books which Miss Hormel will take up are "Broad and Alien is the World" by Ciro Alegria prize winning novel of a recent Latin American contest; "Lands of New-World Neighbors" by Hans Christian Andersen; "The Unknown Country" by Bruce Hutchison, an excellent new book on Canada; "Good Neighbors" by Hubert Herring; and "American Strategy in World Politics."

She will also comment on the attitude of Argentina in the present war situation and on the migration of South American countries by the Japanese.
