Cutting There isn't a man on the Birmingham City Commission who takes any more interest in the welfare and beautification of this community than Wilmer E. Modoly. Last week he asked this newspaper to make a special plea to local citizens to do something about the elimination of weeds. So we published an article on the subject, and hope that most of you read it—and are doing something about it, too!

Most people do attend to the weed problem in their own improved yards; some of them heautify next-door vacant lots, even though they may not hold title to them. The problem of most of the weed subject, however, is on those pieces of vacant property in subdivision areas, or between homes that are distant from one another.

The cost of cutting these weeds is not much, on the per lot basis. Less than a dollar, is the estimate of City Manager Donald C. Egbert, for a lot 50 feet wide and 140 feet


