

### Congressional Comment by Dandero

**Individual Income Taxes**  
The revenue bill recently approved by the House will increase Federal revenues by nearly six billion dollars and bring our Federal tax load for the year up to 24 billion dollars; and this is a total four times that annually collected in the first World War. This bill provides for an increase of nearly three billion dollars in individual income taxes, approximately one-half of the total scheduled increase for all taxes.

At the present time individual income taxes account for five billion dollars in Federal revenue. The House approved increase will raise this total to eight billion dollars. Individual income tax revenues will come within two billion dollars of the total income tax imposition on corporations.

The exemption for single persons is reduced from \$750 to \$500, and that for married persons from \$1,500 to \$1,200. The present \$400 exemption for each dependent is continued. Members of our armed forces are entitled to a \$750 exemption if single and a \$1,500 exemption if married.

The rate of the normal tax is increased 50%, from 4% to 6%. The surtax has been increased all along the line. The minimum rate is raised from 6% to 12%, an increase of more than 100%. The maximum surtax rate is increased from 77% to 82%, and will apply to incomes in excess of \$200,000 instead of \$500,000 as at present.

Combining the normal tax and the surtax the total rate applicable to the first dollar of taxable income in excess of the personal exemption will be 19%, as compared with 10% under existing law, or nearly double the present rate of taxation.

There is no change in the present earned-income credit, 10% of the earned income. There is no provision making it mandatory for husbands and wives to file joint returns.

Again, as in 1942 returns, the taxpayer may file a short form return if his income does not exceed \$3,000. Use of this short form is optional.

Here are some examples of how the increases in individual income taxes will affect different taxpayers:

The tax of a single person earning \$800 a year will be increased from \$3.00 to \$52.20.  
The tax of a single person earning \$1,200 a year will be increased from \$4.20 to \$125.80.  
The tax of a single person earning \$2,000 a year will be increased from \$12.00 to \$212.80.

When slightly thickened fold in 2 cups of whipped cream and 3-4 cup brown peppermint candy. Freeze.

**Lemon Ice Cream**  
1 cup sugar  
1 pint of cream, whipped  
2 tablespoons flour  
2 tablespoons cold water  
Juice of 2 lemons and grated rind of 1 lemon.

Beat egg yolks light, add 1-2 cup of sugar to which the flour has been mixed, and lemon juice, water and grated rind. Put into a double boiler and cook until thick, as custard. Beat egg whites stiff; add remaining sugar and pour the hot custard over the beaten egg whites. Cool. Fold whipped cream into the mixture. Freeze.

**Chocolate Ice Cream**  
2 cups milk  
2 tablespoons cornstarch  
1 cup sugar  
2 ounces unsweetened chocolate  
2 egg yolks  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1/2 pint cream, whipped.

Scald milk in top of double boiler. Combine sugar and cornstarch and add to scalded milk. Cook 10 minutes. Add hot mixture to slightly beaten egg yolks, add melted chocolate. Return to the double boiler and cook until thick, about 5 minutes. If custard thickens, remove from fire and beat with rotary egg beater. Cool, add vanilla and fold in whipped cream. Freeze.

**Cherry Ice Cream**  
2-3 cup sweetened condensed milk  
1 cup cherry juice from can of sour pitted cherries  
1/2 teaspoon lemon juice  
1-2 cup cherries, chopped  
1 cup cream

Blend condensed milk, cherry juice, lemon juice and cherries. Chill. Whip cream and fold into the chilled mixture. Freeze. Remove from refrigerator once or twice during the freezing period, scrape the mixture from side and bottom of pan and beat thoroughly.

**Peanut Brittle Bique**  
3 tablespoons quick tapcon  
2 cups milk scalded  
1-4 teaspoon salt  
4 tablespoons light corn syrup  
2 tablespoons sugar  
2 egg whites  
1 cup cream, whipped  
1-2 pound peanut brittle, finely crushed or ground  
1 teaspoon vanilla

Add tapcon to milk and cook in double boiler 15 minutes or until tapcon is clear and mixture thickened, stirring frequently. Strain hot mixture, stirring (not rubbing) through very fine mixture. Add salt and corn syrup. Mix thoroughly. Cool. Add sugar, stiffly beaten egg whites. Fold into cold tapcon mixture. Fold in whipped cream, vanilla and peanut brittle. Freeze.

**Peppermint Lime Ice Cream**  
Dissolve one package lime flavored gelatin in 1-3 cups of hot water.
