Also Approves Snow Removal

Editor, The Eccentric: I was pleased to note the letter of Robert VanBuren in your last week's issue anent the removal of snow from our local sidewalks, and I am sure that the ordinance is a great trouble with the ordinance is that the city does not enforce it. And without enforcement the ordinance is null and void. In Detroit, if you do not clean your sidewalks promptly, even on a vacant lot, after a snowstorm, a policeman appears to inquire why you did not obey the law and makes it mighty unpleasant for you in case of defiance. I presume the local ordinance has teeth in it and a few stiff penalties assessed against those who disregard its provisions would be observed. I have to pay out good money, after every snowfall, to have my sidewalks cleaned while my neighbor, who goes to Florida every winter, does not have his cleaned at all. Our police force is too small to check up on these violations, but it really should not be necessary. Common decency and the desire to do as you would be done by, should be enough to influence every householder. Sidewalks are particularly dangerous to old people and little children and can only be avoided by snow removal. In this season of Good Will to All Men set your neighbor a good example by keeping your sidewalk scrupulously clean. And, in the meantime, it would not at all be a bad idea for The Eccentric to publish the wording of the ordinance so that all who are liable to break their necks on an icy sidewalk may read.

"I am all snow and ice not removed from public sidewalks within 24 hours after the accumulation, deposit or formation thereof" is a nuisance. Visitors are subject to arrest, but so far as is known, no arrest has ever been made.)

How to Tell Age of Male Pheasant

EAST LANSING—The difference of one-tenth of an inch in the length of a cock pheasant's spur can be used, along with other "keys," to tell a bird-of-the-year from an older bird, conservation department game men examining pheasants shot at Rose Lake wildlife experiment station this season have concluded.

Spurs of juvenile birds normally are blunt, light-colored, not very hard and not more than four-tenths of an inch long. Spurs of older pheasants are sharply pointed, usually black, hard, curved, and from four-tenths to a little more than five-tenths of an inch long.

Quickest test of a cock pheasant's age is whether the weight of the bird will break the bill when the bird is picked up by the lower bill alone. Bones and lower bill of birds-of-the-year usually are not strong enough to support the bird's weight, and break easily.
