Episcopal Church Will Go on Air For 13 Weeks

A full hour of church services for the sick and ether shut-ins will be broadcast each Sunday, beginning Dec. 27, by three Episcopal churches of Oakland County over Station WCAR at 11 a. m.

This was announced Wednesday by the pastors of the three churches sponsoring the broadcasts: the Rev. C. H. Cadigan of Christ Church Cranbrook; the Rev. Bates G. Bart of All Saints, Pontiac; and the Rev. Warner L. Forsyth, of St. James, Birmingham.

First broadcast will be from Christ Church, followed on successive Sundays by broadcasts from All Saints and St. James. The original schedule has been projected for 13 weeks and will be continued thereafter if the response is satisfactory.

This series of broadcasts—the first to be engaged in by Episcopal churches in Oakland County—is financed by interested layman of the three parishes.
