and window and door frames of brick, stone and stucco houses. Insulate your ceilings and walls. Common types of insulating material, such as loose fill, blanket, batt or board insulation, can be installed in an unfinished attic by the home owner who is skillful with his hands. To insulate a finished attic or the side walls of your house, however, consult an expert. The government pamphlet quoted below reports an estimated saving of fuel for every 100 square feet of ceiling insulation in Boston, as follows: 30 Gals. of oil saved; 18 to 23 Pcs. of coal saved; 375 to 430 Cu. ft. of gas saved 4356 to 7260.

Put your heating equipment in good condition. According to the OPA pamphlet, the heating efficiency of most furnaces can be considerably increased, as it is estimated that from 30-60 gallons of oil of every 100, and from 500 lbs. of coal, are lost through faulty equipment.

Use your fuel efficiently. Get detailed fueling instructions from your dealer, preferably an oil or coal firing chart that you can hang in your cellar. With an oil burner, your best protection against heat loss is a certificate from your service man stating that he has brought your burner up to the minimum standards of the National Bureau of Standards. With a coal burner, keep plenty of coal on the grates, and hold back heat by working the dampers properly: use the right size of coal; shake your grates only when you have to make room for fresh coal or to keep the fire going.

REMEMBER, CONSUMERS!
The coal in your bins—the oil in your storage tank were brought to you by tanker over dangerous sea lanes, or by railroad tank or trucks already burdened with war shipments vitally needed by our fighting men. Save this costly fuel; make it do full wartime duty protecting the health of your families!

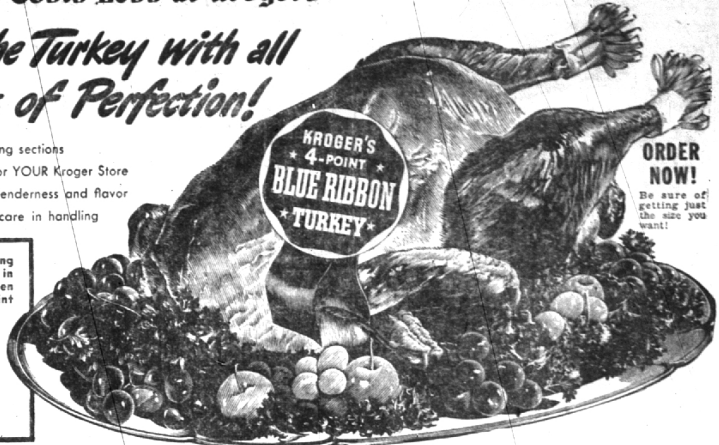
