I take another three or four years. I think that our aircraft will stop their industrial production; and this, plus victories such as that in North Africa, will bring about a German collapse.

"Do you foresee that the German collapse will come as readily as in 1918, or do you think the Allies will keep control?" he was queried further.

"The end will come all at once and no Gestapo will be able to stop it," he declared.

He left Birmingham Saturday afternoon.

Simultaneous Fires Bring Siren Alarm On Christmas Day

"What happens when two fires occur at the same time?" is a question often asked (Times).

The answer was given on the afternoon of Christmas when two minor calls started considerable commotion, including the calling of volunteers with the sirens.

At 2:54 p.m. at the E. S. McCombe home, 504 Lakeside, the firetrucks could not handle a large quantity of gift wrapping paper, and when the house was filled with smoke, the department was called to make an investigation. There was no damage.

One of the regulars was left at the station, so at 3 p.m. when another call came in, he promptly summoned the sirens to call in volunteers. They went to the home of Theodore Mitchell, 500 Haynes, where a cigaret forgotten by a roomer fell to the floor and ignited the wood, with minor loss.

"This is a good time to point out again that three whistles of the siren mean a fire; continuous blowing indicates a real or practice air raid," Chief Vernon W. Griffin declared.

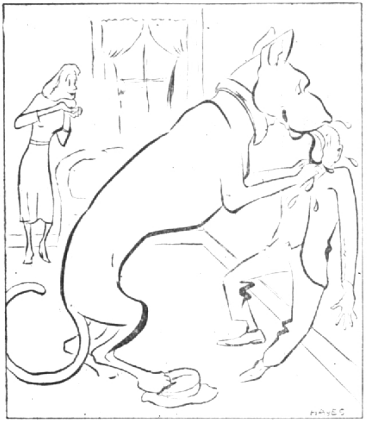

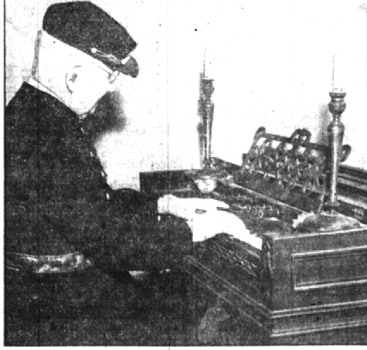
