**Federal School Aid
Needed in Defense
Area, Higgins Says**

George M. Higgins, state representative, addressed the morning session of the Oakland County Federation of Women's Clubs last Friday at the Community House. He stated that much of \$6,000,000 appropriated by the legislature for civilian defense, will go to the state police department, a non-political group which plays an important part in home defense, adding that more men are needed to carry out the program effectively.

Mrs. Higgins expressed the opinion that more federal aid must be given to Michigan schools, especially in congested migrant areas such as Willow Run. He further discussed the practice of evading the sales tax by small industries, explaining that the state employs only 100 auditors, which is inadequate to cover the \$3,000 business enterprises in the state.

Spurbs must follow Detroit's lead in the question of blackouts, according to Higgins, who told his audience that when the blackout signal sounds, all traffic must pull to the side of the road and wait for all-clear.
