"Public Health Laws and Standards" is to be topic of the meeting on Monday, Feb. 16, at 1:30 p. m. in the Community House. Mrs. John Lambie will lead the discussion. The subject of public health, you know, is of paramount interest to the League at this time and in fact, will hold the spotlight of interest during the coming year.

The following summary of points has been agreed upon by the general committee of the League of Women Voters. The League is to continue with its basic program and purpose—that of creating a better understanding of the functions of government. A task of special importance is local government, the importance of which is often underrated in normal times and whose functions are almost eclipsed in public attention during war.

The summary also stated that the League should attempt to help elect a congress which is capable of dealing not only with present problems, but also with post-war organization for peace.

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The day will start out with a group discussion on housing, welfare and consumer's problems at 9:30 in the morning. At 11 o'clock another group discussion meeting will be held on the subject, "The Contributions of Labor and Management to our War Program." This will be followed by a luncheon at which the honoree, Mrs. E. E. Fisher is chairman of the luncheon. Mrs. John English at the University of Wisconsin, Mrs. Emil Storkan, past president of the Michigan division and now regional vice-president, will speak. Hampikian Tells Gardeners to Plant Vegetables Rich in Vitamins

Hand Hampikian, noted lecturer from Detroit, spoke on "Today's Defense" and its bearing on most of us, in an interesting address to members of the Birmingham Branch of the National Farm and Garden Club at their monthly meeting Monday afternoon in the Community House. Mr. Hampikian stressed the importance of planting and growing vegetables only to neglect to bring them to maturity. He also said that we should only grow those vegetables which are rich in vitamins and can be dried or canned for use during the winter.

A committee is to be formed, sponsored by the Michigan Horticultural Society, to further the idea of collective gardening as a more effective method of growing fruits and vegetables for a small group of families, according to the speaker. It is felt that more time, energy, and money can be saved by utilizing an acre of land for four families than by the individual family doing its own gardening. Following the talk Mr. Hampikian showed colored slides of many lovely and unusual varieties of pinks and delphinium.
